Council of Agencies Serving South Asians (CASSA)

- ☐ A social justice umbrella agency representing over 120 member agencies serving South Asian and other racialized communities in Ontario with policy, research, advocacy, and training
- □ Located in Toronto, Ontario serve all of Ontario
- Mission: To facilitate the economic, social, political and cultural empowerment of South Asians by serving as a resource for information, research, mobilization, coordination and leadership on social justice issues affecting our communities. We also seek to create social change by building alliances and working collaboratively with those who share a vision of empowering all communities to participate in defining Canada's future.
- ☐ Values: Social Justice, Anti—oppression, anti-racism, anti-homophobia, Responsiveness, Diversity, Collaboration and solidarity, and Accountability

Toronto (over 50% racialized communities):

Phase 2: Recruitment of Participants

- 229 Participants recruited in total
- ☐ Recruitment Methods:
 - Social media
 - CASSA member agencies
 - Other settlement and integration agencies
 - Participants came from South Asian and other racialized communities

Phase 4: Sub Project Implementation

9 Sub-Projects – 1 per sector per region

Trained participants invited to join an agency to work on sub-projects

Objectives:

- Increase participation of diverse communities in the programming and services of partner agencies and 3 sectors in general
- Help partner agencies develop programming and services that are reflective of the population they are serving
- Develop an understanding of using anti-racist and anti-oppressive framework for all participants and partner agencies

Scarborough Arts

- Organized panel discussions with artists on using diversity and inclusion lens
- Artists included Indigenous and other racialized artists, Queer artists, storytellers, and scholars
- Worked with Scarborough Arts for 5 weeks to put on two consecutive panel discussions

Thorncliffe Park Youth Cricket Club

- Organized the 2018 Heritage Cup a four week cricket tournament in the Thorncliffe Park Neighbourhood
- All participants created reflections on their experience undergoing training and implementing the project

Maple High School

- Focus group and panel organized by high school students for young racialized girls to discuss the barriers they face to participating in community sports
- The feedback from this session was turned into a submission to the Ontario provincial government on Physical Education with recommendations

Social Services Network

Inergenerational Photovoice on Ageism

- A youth group organized an event at a Seniors' Home in Unionville to discuss the issue of ageism from both youth and seniors perspectives

Art Gallery of Mississauga

- An event was organized at the Gallery to discuss Bonnie Devine's, an indigenous artist, work called "Circles and Lines: Michi Saagiig" through a lens of art-making, colonialism, diaspora, and identity
- The outreach for the event prioritized outreach for racialized communities in the City of Mississauga in order to diversify the participation at the Gallery from local community members

The Council of Agencies Serving South Asians (CASSA)'s work is on traditional Indigenous territories of the Huron-Wendat, Haudenosaunee, and the territory of the Mississaugas of the Credit. Bike Brampton

- Project participants organized a community consultation with Bike Brampton for the City of Brampton to seek input on ways the community would like to use cycling to get around the City
- Outreach was focused on the racialized communities in the city, in particular, on the Punjabi Sikh community (majority)
- The discussion centred around health and safety, traffic issues, tips from veteran cyclists
- The input was turned into an Infographic for Bike Brampton to use in their advocacy and also translated into Punjabi

Volunteer MBC

- A training module was developed with the StepUp Youth Ambassadors Executive team on Anti-Racism and Anti-Oppression to use to train other youth in the Region of Peel
- Through this project the Executive team learned facilitation skills for their training, how to promote volunteerism among youth, and how to engage the wider community
- The training module was turned into a Zine by the participants a popular tool used by youth

Phase 5: Local Result Sharing

- Once all 9 sub-projects were completed, 3 community forums; one in each region, were organized by CASSA and the project participants
- Participants presented their projects to the community and service providers and policy makers in the three sectors of focus
- Participants received a certificates of training and project completion at these events
- ❖ Objective: to share knowledge with appropriate stakeholders to influence the way they plan their programming to increase the participation of diverse communities
- To provide a networking platform for participants to interact with agencies and policy makers in the sector of their interest

Phase 6: Independent Evaluation

- An independent evaluation was conducted to measure:
- o if the Intercultural Collaborative met its deliverables,
- the impact the project had on project participants
- the impact the project had on partner agencies
- o to seek input on program improvements for other agencies interested in replicating the project

Phase 7: National Result Sharing

Objectives:

- To share knowledge and lessons learned with like-minded, social justice, and sector specific agencies to influence their programming and services to include more participation from diverse communities
- To share Anti-Racism, Anti-Oppression training modules to use for their clients and staff
- To provide information on replicating a similar project including possible funding from the Department of Canadian Heritage

Project Outcomes - Participants

Page 13-14 of Evaluation

Project participants reported:

- Increased connection to the arts, sports, civic, and/or youth engagement sectors: opportunity to speak and be heard
- Gained valuable knowledge and skills on project management, event planning, and antioppression
- Increased networks: tangible experience in the not profit sector
- Change in attitude and behaviour in how they respond to racism and oppression
- Mean satisfaction among participants was 4.8 out of 5

Project Outcomes – Partner Agencies

Page 12 of Evaluation

Partner agencies reported:

- Increased connections to community groups
- o increased knowledge to improve their programs and services
- o using the input from the sub-projects directly in their future programming i.e. Bike Brampton Infographic and Volunteer MBC training zine
- o suggestions for improvement in order to have a greater impact on the sector

- ☐ Tips for CSMARI:
- Involve multiple diverse communities in project
- Framework should revolve around anti-racism
- Strong evaluation and information dissemination for result sharing wide reach
- Ensure no budget items are ineligible
- Support letters are strongly recommended from partners
- Set realistic goals and deliverables
- Ensure project/event is not part of ongoing/core work of agency
